



NO OVARIES, NO PROBLEM!

NO MORE HEAT CYCLES

While cycles can vary, female felines usually go into heat four to five days every three weeks during breeding season. In an effort to advertise for mates, they'll yowl as if they are in pain, and urinate more frequently—sometimes all over the house!

NO MORE RISK OF MAMMARY GLAND TUMORS OR OVARIAN CANCER

Spaying can also prevent mammary gland tumors, the third most common problem in female cats. A high percentage of mammary tumors are malignant: in cats, nearly 90 percent are malignant. Once a mammary tumor spreads to the lungs or bones, the cancer will be fatal. An un-spayed cat is seven times more likely than a spayed cat to develop mammary tumors. Less common conditions such as uterine and ovarian cancer are 100 percent prevented by spaying.

NO MORE UNWANTED KITTENS

How would you feel if your intact female cat got pregnant and had litter after litter of kittens?

Now more kittens will be added to a world in which there are not enough homes. Any kittens created by your female cat will take homes away from kittens who are already here, and boy are there a lot of them.

Spayed female cats live thirty nine percent longer than un-spayed ones. They also have a lessened risk of mammary tumors, pyometra (an infection of the uterus), and ovarian cancer. They do not roam to seek out mates, and they do not produce unwanted kittens. They are happier and healthier once spayed.
